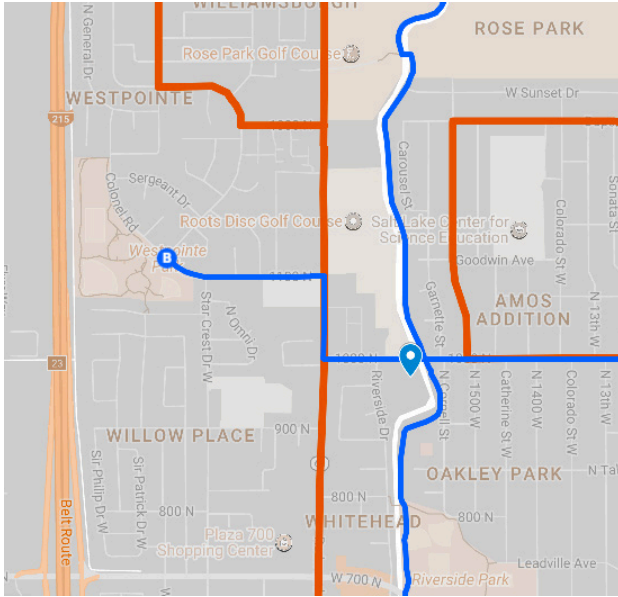

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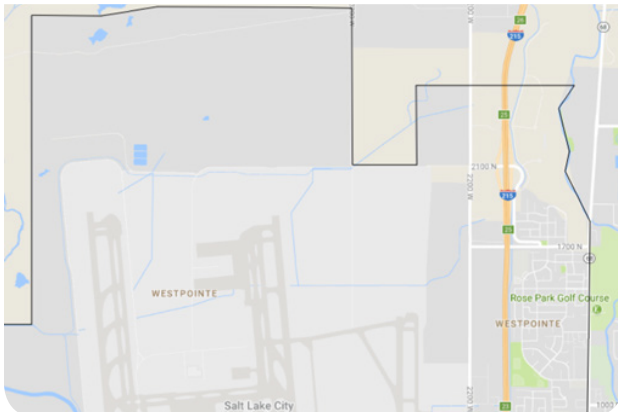


How do I get to the meetings?

Westpointe Boundaries



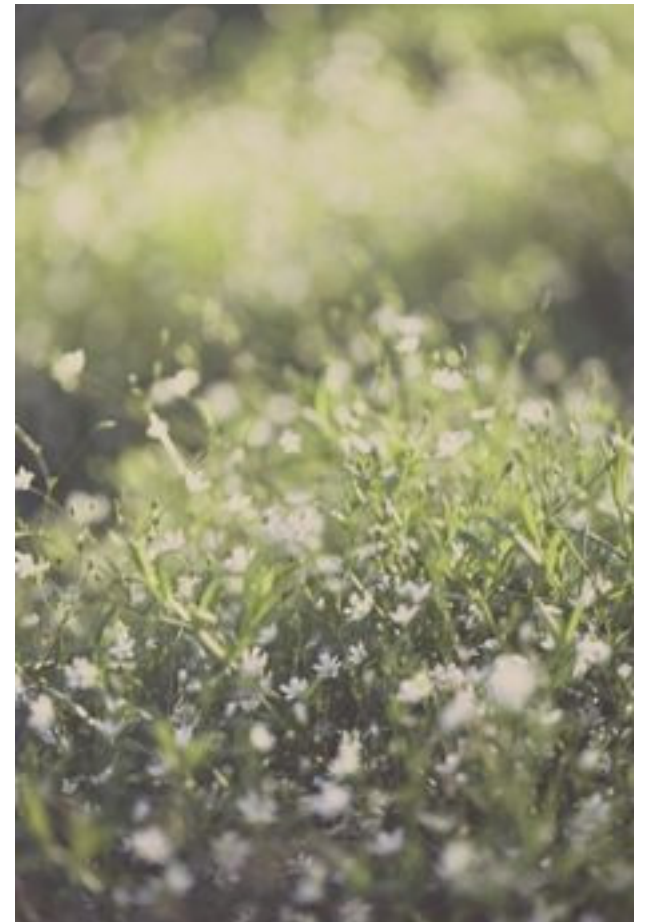

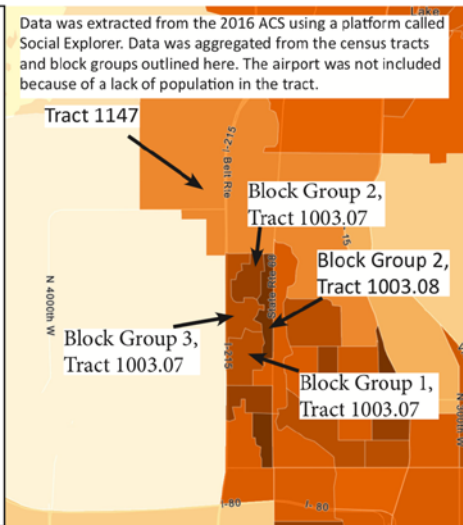

Demographics Report

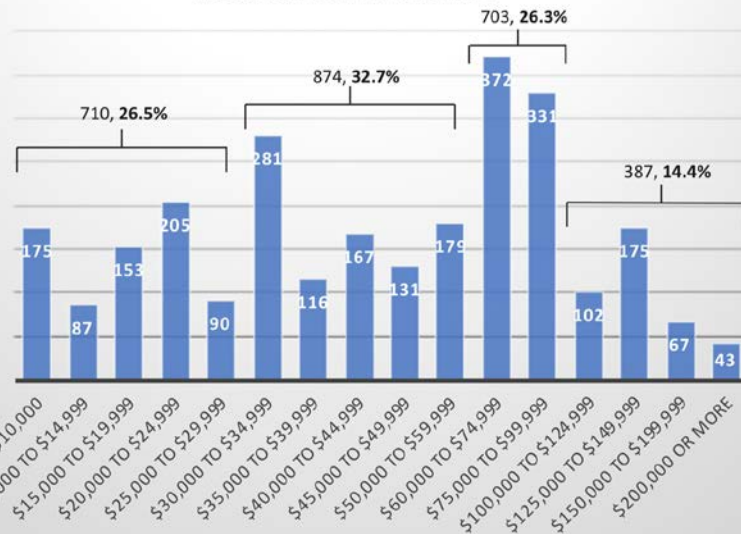
Key Take Away Points:

- 81% of Westpoine households are families (related or couples) and 59% of households have one or more person under 18 years old.
- 69% of Westpoine residents are non-white with 42% being Hispanic.
- 50% are struggling economically including 20% who are living in poverty.
- 50% of Westpoine adult residents (over 25) have some post secondary education but only 16% have a college degree. 24% did not complete high school.
- 2/3rds of Westpoine residents own their own home. 74% of the residences are single family homes.
- 42% of renters pay greater than half their total income for rent and housing costs.

Data was extracted from the 2016 ACS using a platform called Social Explorer. Data was aggregated from the census tracts and block groups outlined here. The airport was not included because of a lack of population in the tract.



Household Income

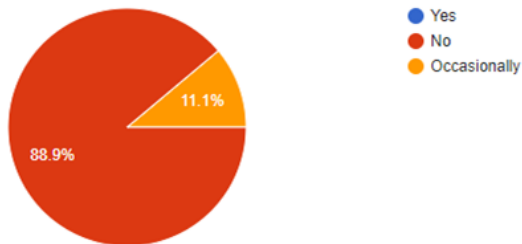

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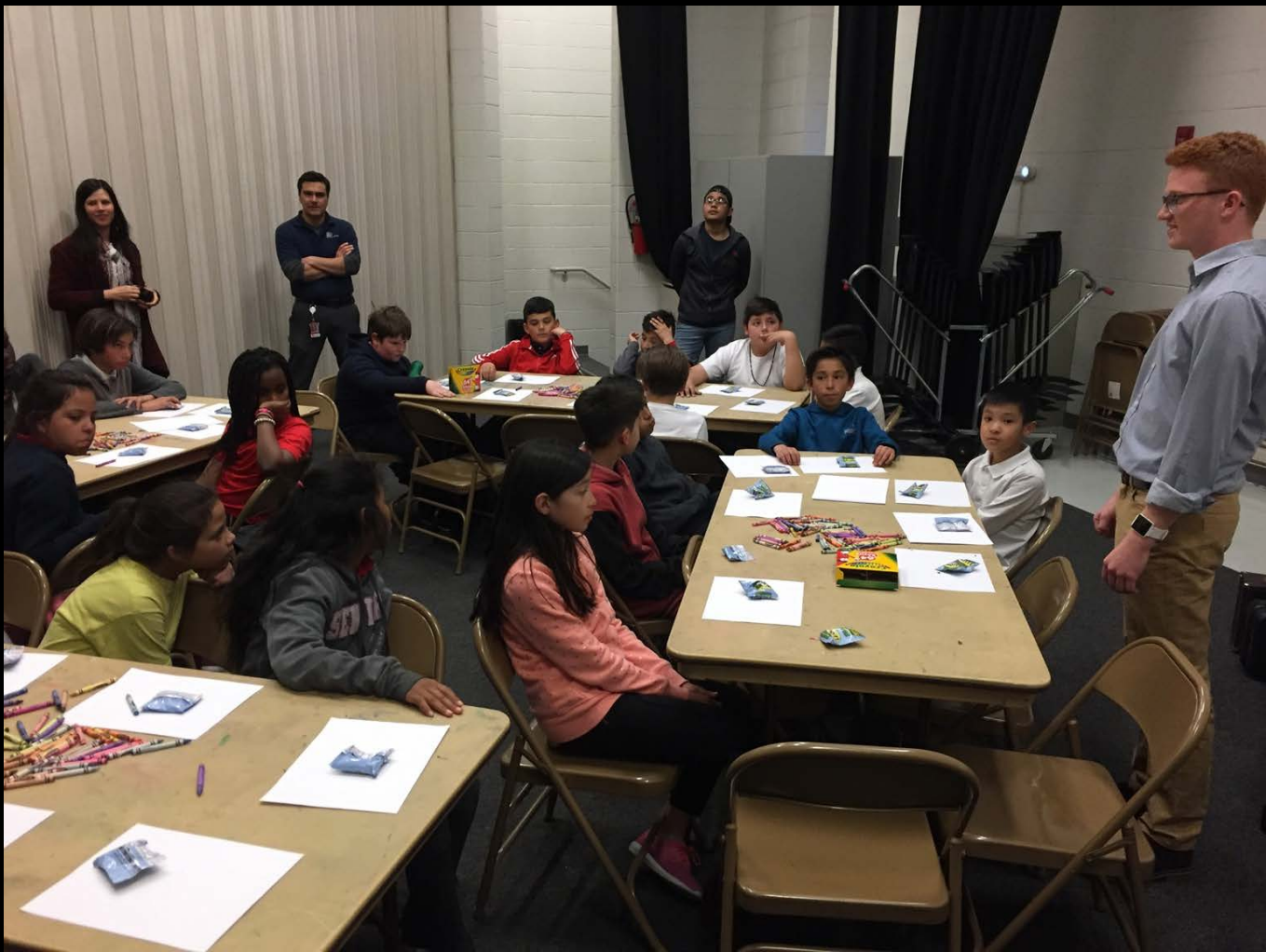

Westpointe Park is a 27 acre park maintained by Salt Lake City. It serves the needs of a diverse and rich community, including over 10,000 Westpointe residents.

Park reservation can be made by calling 801-472-7860 or by visiting <http://www.slc.gov/westpointe>.

Park reservation cost \$40 for SLC residents and \$75 for non-residents. A recreation kit is available at the time of reservation and includes 2 softball, 2 baseball bat, 1 volleyball and 1 volleyball net, 1 set of bocceballs, 1 football and 1 soccer ball.

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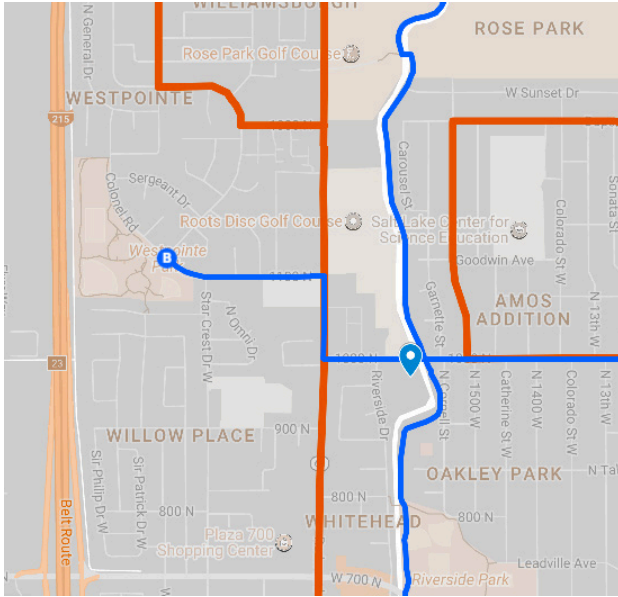
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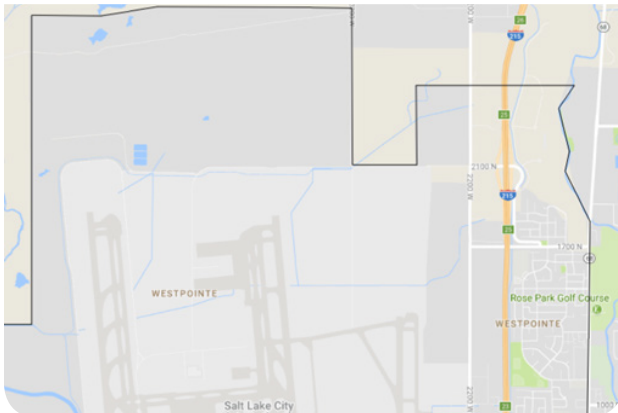


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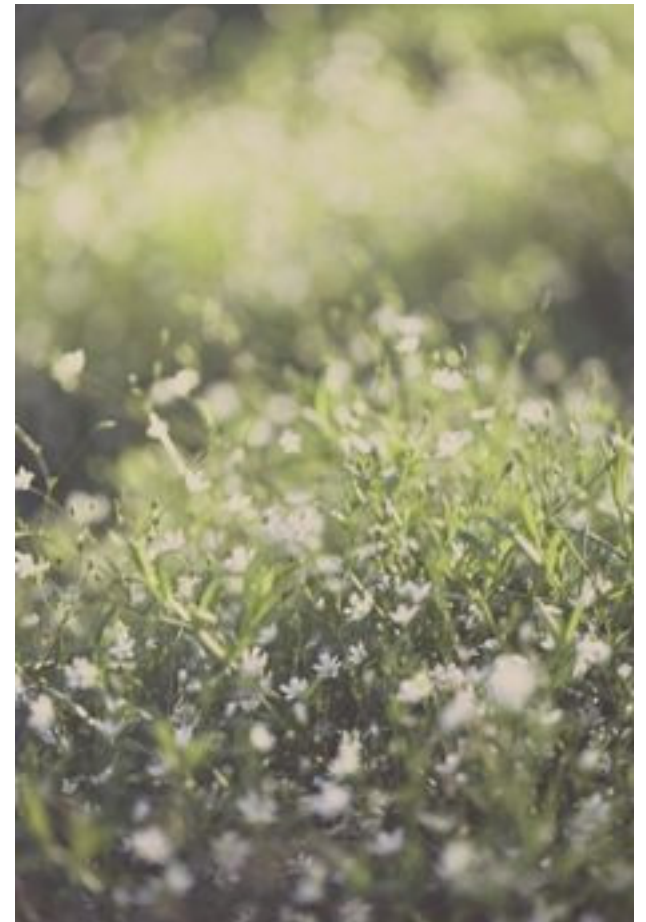

The one thing I learned about this whole survey process: door-to-door solicitation is tough and demoralizing work.

Jared and I went to a Westpointe neighborhood and went to each house down several streets to ask people to take a simple survey on community councils and engagement. It was a fairly cool and windy spring day; not a lot of people were outside. We went to the first couple houses together because we were intimidated about the process at first. Both of them were Hispanic families who did not speak a word of English, and it took a long time to get the responses because of that. However, they invited us into their home and offered us some water as they assumed we had been out for hours. They had to have their young children come and interpret what we were saying to them, but since we had the survey in both English and Spanish printed, we were able to get responses from them after some time. Those homes were a great learning experience and it was good to try and communicate with people who don't speak the same language as you do.

Jared and I split up after those two homes for fear that we would be out all day if they all took that long. Unfortunately it did not get easier as we went on. I would say that at least half of the homes that we went to did not answer their door at all, and then half of those that did refused to take the survey for a variety of reasons. They weren't interested, didn't have time to do so at the moment, weren't feeling well and I had just woken them up from their nap, etc. The one that made me feel bad the most was an older gentleman who answered the door and said he had just had surgery. He told me he had finally managed to fall asleep just before I rang the doorbell. He wasn't mean or anything, which I think made me feel even more embarrassed.

There were a couple of interesting experiences I did have talking to people to though. One older white man talked to me about how he had participated in years past with the community council, but that he was now focused more on the national issues at hand. He told me that he was thinking about putting his name on the ballot to run against Mitt Romney in the upcoming election, and that he liked his chances. To say the least, I found his confidence very interesting. Another family answered the door a little later on that told me they were immigrants from Pakistan. They did not seem to know anything about what community councils even were, and only spoke a little bit of English. Inside their home, there was a very strong curry smell, so I could tell they were from that part of the world. I did get a survey response from them, and did my best to explain what a community council was to them.

Door-to-door surveying was a hard experience. We did not get very many responses in the several hours that we were knocking on doors, and it is intimidating to knock on people's door by yourself. Most of the people who answered seemed to be foreign-born and did not speak very good English, which made things even tougher. Overall it was a great reminder for me to stay in school so I don't have to do that kind of work for a living!

The Westpointe Community Council, located near the Salt Lake International airport, will celebrate the local Westpointe Park (1920 W 1100 N) with the installation of a community sign. The sign itself was designed by K-6 students at North Star Elementary school, just a short walk from the park itself. The objective of this sign will be to show the name of the sign and enhance the connection that kids in the neighborhood feel to the park.

University students Taylor Nelson and Jared Stewart developed the project as Westpointe Community members identified a lack of signs at the park. Prior to this project, the 23-acre park has no signs to identify its name or give it a sense of community. Nelson and Stewart coordinated with North Star administration and held an art workshop with elementary students who produced drawings of what “community” meant to them. These drawings were then put into a collage and printed on the sign. The sign will be located on the north end of the park, closest to the location of North Star Elementary school. Westpointe residents and elementary students will be able to walk to the park and see the art that they themselves produced.

The success of this project can be attributed to the Westpointe Community Council, North Star Elementary school, Salt Lake Parks and Public Lands, Schmidt Signs and Graphics, and the University of Utah Westside Studio.
